MINISTER'S LETTER

Of all the books that I read at school, it has undoubtedly been Harper Lee's 'To Kill A Mockingbird' that I have returned to most in the years since. Exposing, as it does, the absurdity of racial prejudice and the subsequent injustices that it creates, this novel has touched me deeply. And some



of its words have remained with me almost 30 years after encountering them for the first time.

'You never really understand a person until you consider things from his [or her, I would add] point of view - until you climb into his [or her] skin and walk around it.' So says Atticus Finch, father of Scout, the little girl through whose eyes the story is told.

These words have returned to me powerfully this week. Having ruptured the Achilles tendon in my left leg in a freak table tennis injury(!), I am now having to adjust to life with a cast and crutches.

Just a couple of days on from the incident and already I am discovering just how difficult some of even the most basic of daily tasks can be for some. Getting washed, dressed, downstairs, breakfast etc., have now all become major challenges fraught with difficulty. Even sitting at my desk isn't easy (which is why this letter could well be shorter than usual!) and all this before I've even contemplated going out.

But whilst I have been viewing my predicament as a temporary inconvenience, I am more than aware that for many this lack of mobility is/has become a way of life. If this is you and I am aware of it, please know that I now have even more admiration for you than I did before. If I am not aware of your daily struggles, please let me and others know. And if, like me, you haven't for a while found yourself considering what life might be like for someone else, please spend some time reflecting on the words of Atticus Finch:

'You never really understand a person until you consider things from

his [or her] point of view - until you climb into his [or her] skin and walk around it.'

These words might not be found in Scripture but they wouldn't be out of place there.

Joan was a life long member of Martin Way Church until she moved to Devon with Jan & Bob and her sister Betty a few years ago. Joan moved into the Morden area in 1941 and married her late husband Albert at Martin Way.

Joan was a very active member of the church over many years. Jan remembers at the age of 10 years her mum becoming a practicing Christian when she entered into full membership of the church. Joan took on many roles at Martin Way over the years; she was a class leader which also involved carrying out pastoral visiting. She became the flower secretary after having been taught by Mr Maggs, also a past well known member of Martin Way. She was also the Christian Aid week organiser and in the early years ran the women's sewing work group. Joan was superb at needlework having attended a tailoring course at evening class, Jan remembers this very well as a small child because she would always 'kick off' when her mum had to go out to the class! Nevertheless Joan continued with her evening classes and from needlework and tailoring moved on to pottery classes, I'm not clear if Jan still 'kicked off' or perhaps had got over that stage by then!

Joan was a qualified milliner and made her own beautiful hats. I remember when I first joined Martin Way back in the early 70's Joan would never be seen in church without wearing one of her hats, that, of

course, always matched her outfit. She always had material to spare and I remember her making my daughter Sarah a lovely Easter bonnet for the school competition.

Joan was a devoted daughter to her own mum especially when she became old and needed extra care; Joan lovingly looked after and cared for her. She was also a wonderful carer/babysitter for Peter and Andrew again over many years which enabled Jan and Bob themselves to become very active members of the church, preaching and leading the Circuit Youth Choir. Joan was lovingly known as Grandma not only by her own grandsons but I'm sure by my own son John, who I believe thought he had an extra granny when he was growing up as he always called her Grandma, but then so too did many of us! I'm sure largely, Joan will undoubtedly be remembered in her role as the Sunday School Superintendent. She took this role very seriously indeed and as a past Sunday School teacher I have never forgotten the regular meetings we had at her home in Southway; there would always be a warm welcome and of course refreshments were always supplied.

Joan was a lovely lady and a devoted Christian, she had many friends at Martin Way some of whom have already been 'called home' but many of us who are still here will always remember her. Jan told me that Joan did make new friends at the church in Kingsbridge so I'm sure not only will she be missed by us her old friends and of course her family, but also by the new friendships she made in Devon.

For those who were unable to attend the funeral in Devon on the 24th February, there will be a memorial tea at Martin Way a week or so later. Jan and Bob would like this to be a relaxed time of catching up with the folk at Martin Way and sharing memories of Joan. Our thoughts and prayers are with Jan, Bob, Pete and Andy at this time and pray that they may feel the presence of the comforter about them and rest in the knowledge that 'Grandma' is now at peace with Him.

CREATING SAFER SPACE

Foundation Module

Dear all,

I have recently been on the Methodist Church 'Creating safer Space' Foundation Module about Safe guarding Children, Young People and Vulnerable adults. Angela Linton-Smith (who is now our Circuit's Safe Guarding Coordinator) and Margaret Adams have also attended this course and we have been asked to roll this training programme out to all our Churches for those in a role listed below:

- Presbyters with an active preaching or pastoral ministry
- Deacons with an active preaching or pastoral ministry
- Pre-ordination students and probationers
- Lay employees & Volunteer Workers with pastoral responsibility
- Pastoral Visitors
- Anyone working with 0 18 year olds in the name of the church
- Anyone working in activities targeted at adults who are vulnerable (e.g. luncheon club for the housebound
- Church stewards
- Circuit stewards
- Local preachers
- worship leaders
- Those training for local preaching or worship leading
- Church and circuit safeguarding representatives
- Choir/music group/drama leaders where there are 0-18 year olds or vulnerable adults in the group.

People in the above roles who have received safeguarding training in other positions (e.g. as a teacher, police officer or social services) still need to attend. The training is specific to the church context. In the same way, such a person would NOT be exempt from education/police training, because they have done the church training. Their attendance is also valuable because of the expertise they can share with other trainees.

It is required that anyone in these roles must attend the training by September 2012 otherwise they will not be able to continue in their position. It may seem like a drastic statement but this subject is a very important and by attending the training it helps to protect you as well as the Children, Young People and Vulnerable Adults.

We really would appreciate you attending this course it takes between $2-2\frac{1}{2}$ hours and we have 2 dates for you to choose from;

- Tuesday 15th March 7.15pm for 7.30pm start at Wimbledon Methodist Church
- Thursday 27th March 7.15pm for 7.30pm start at Martin Way Methodist Church

The Creating Safer Space training will help you:

- know that Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility and integral to being church
- to have a better understanding of good safeguarding practice within the Methodist Church
- to know when to have concerns about the safety and welfare of a child, young person or vulnerable adult
- to recognise blocks within the church and responding to it.
- to appreciate your responsibility for sharing concerns about a child, young person or vulnerable adult
- to be aware of who in the church to go to with any concerns.

Please email or phone Angela Linton-Smith or myself to let us know which training session you will be attending so we have a rough idea on numbers by Sunday 11th March at the latest.

Barry and Margaret Mizen have known suffering and loss at first hand. They will tell how they have coped with the murder of their son Jimmy, on the day after his 16th birthday, four years ago. He was, they say, their 'sparkle of hope'. Jimmy was killed in a violent attack on him by 19-year-old Jake Fahri in the Three Cooks Bakery in Lee, south-east London, on 10 May 2008. In a rage, Fahri, who was sentenced to a minimum of 14 years in prison, threw a heavy oven glass dish at Jimmy's face. It shattered and severed the main blood vessels to and from Jimmy's heart. He died in the arms of his older brother, Tommy.

Since then, Barry and Margaret have set up the Jimmy Mizen Foundation in his memory. It promotes the development of young people, through supporting youth organisations and apprenticeship placements. They are working on initiatives with the bereaved parents of Damilola Taylor and Rob Knox, the Football Association and the Scouts – to which they donated two new minibuses with £50,000 they had raised in Jimmy's memory. Following a ceremony at Westminster Cathedral in May


2010, they met Prince Charles and Kate McCann, whose daughter Madeleine vanished on a holiday in Portugal. They also spoke to the thousands gathered in Hyde Park, London, during the Pope's visit to Britain. The Mizens say that they want people to discover faith, hope and love. They will tell their moving story.





Church Ladies With typewriters . . .


