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MINISTER'S LETTER



As legend has it, five hundred years ago in October, an act of rebellion took place in Germany that would serve as a catalyst for a series of events that would become known as the Protestant Reformation. On 31st October 1517, an obscure professor of theology, Martin Luther, famously launched an attack on the Roman Catholic Church by nailing his list of criticisms known as the *95 Theses* to a church door in Wittenberg. It is in this form that the story that has been passed down through the generations ever since.

Whether or not events unfolded quite like this is something that scholars continue to debate. What is beyond question is that, in looking at the Church of which he was a part, Luther identified areas of its life and practices that he believed to be corrupt - the most obvious example of this being the practice of selling “indulgences”, certificates meant to assure the buyer that their sins would be forgiven.

This is, of course, a very simplistic reading of these events and, in all honesty, I do not possess enough knowledge to guide you through them. What I am certain of, however, is that this anniversary should not be used to focus on the differences between denominations, or to proclaim any one superior to another. Thus far I have only seen the first episode of BBC's Saturday night drama, *Gunpowder*, but, with the anti-Catholic rhetoric contained within it - not to mention the gruesome torture scenes depicted - it is a helpful reminder in this month of remembering of where such a path has taken us in the past.

I mention the anniversary of Luther's nail-knocking radicalism because it is also a helpful reminder of something else - namely that in each and every age it is our task to ask deep and searching questions of our own beliefs, practices and traditions and to challenge injustices and lazy assumptions as and where we find them. This is true of us as individuals, as church communities and as distinct denominations.

During November we always spend a lot of time remembering. We remember different things and people on different days. There's All Saints Day, All Souls Day, Bonfire Night, Remembrance Sunday and the

International Day for the Eradication of Violence Against Women (White Ribbon Day) on 25th November.

With all this remembering, perhaps we should use the month to do some re-remembering as well. If we use 're' as a prefix, if we put 're' in front of a verb, it means that we do that thing once more. So just as we can view something (look at something), we can re-view something, we can look at it again - which is what Martin Luther was surely doing.

It is in re-remembering that we open ourselves to the possibility of God's Spirit leading us on into new understandings, places and possibilities.

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A personal remembrance



Geraldine never knew her Uncle Bryan. He died during the Second World War, 10 years before she was born, when he was only 22 years old. His mother and sister (Geraldine's grandmother and mother) seldom mentioned the circumstances of his death or talked about the war. Since marrying Geraldine I have been keen to know more about Bryan and to ensure that his sacrifice was not forgotten. Geraldine and I were entrusted by her mother with the care of his medals, some photographs and correspondence, including the letter of condolence from King George VI. From these we discovered that he was once a Boy Scout with Harry Worth who was born in the same village in Yorkshire and who also joined the RAF and later became a television comedian. We learned that Bryan also had a talent for sketching and composing poems and was a jovial lad by nature – his nickname was Bubbly. We had his three medals and some of these documents framed and subsequently our grandchildren have taken them to school as part of projects on the war. In 1985, with the permission of Geraldine's mother, I made some initial enquiries of the Ministry of Defence about Bryan's career in the RAF and received an outline record of his postings and qualifications. He joined the RAF in July 1940 and in August 1941 became an air gunner and was promoted to the rank of sergeant. But still I wanted to know more.

This year I eventually got round to making an enquiry of the National Archives at Kew. Annotations on photographs in our possession indicated that Bryan had died over Duisberg in Germany and this is what had hitherto been understood to be the case, but information from Kew revealed otherwise. As a member of 97 Squadron he had indeed been the front gunner/bomb aimer in a Lancaster bomber for a raid on the industrial city of Duisberg. The aircraft took off from RAF Woodhall Spa with a multi-national crew of seven and apparently reached the target but encountered low cloud and difficult conditions on its return and crashed into the sea only four miles off Wells-Next-The-Sea in Norfolk. Only one crew member was rescued but he subsequently died in hospital. Two bodies were recovered but not Bryan's. He has no known grave and consequently his name is recorded on the Runnymede Memorial. Perhaps it is a blessing his family did not know how close he was to the safety of his base. So near and yet so far.



By coincidence, the week after learning about the location of the crash, Geraldine and I were due to visit Norfolk for a family reunion and we decided to call at Wells. Geraldine selected a pebble from the beach, wrote on it a message of thanksgiving and remembrance, and cast it into the sea. We brought home a shell from the beach as a memento of our visit.

We now know much more about Bryan's life and death but there remains an underlying thirst to learn more. We plan to visit two of the airfields in Norfolk where Bryan was based and to find out more about the sorties he flew on. I have no doubt that further avenues to explore will emerge.

Bryan was only one of the thousands who gave their life during the war and only one of those remembered each Remembrance Sunday. Having a personal connection serves to emphasise the sacrifice that was made for our sake by so many young men and women. However, our interest, respect and gratitude are enduring and the fact that our grandchildren have learnt about the war and developed an interest in their great great uncle's role merely serves to lend meaning to the expression that **“their name liveth for evermore”**.

God bless you Bryan and all the other men and women who gave their lives for us.

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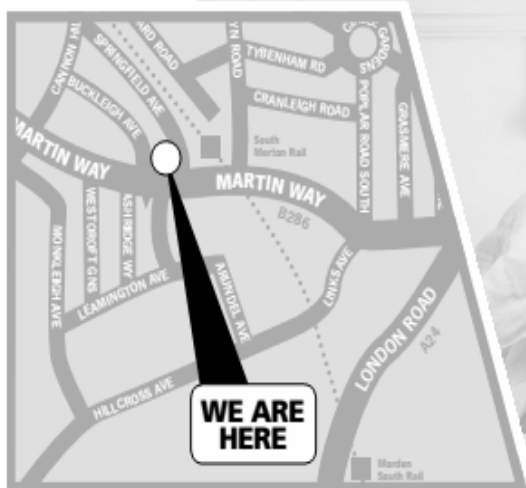

Unforgettable moments of our Holiday in Norfolk (part one)

An advert in my Police retirement magazine for a self-catering holiday caught my eye. It was something we had never done before and as it wasn't too far away to drive and, although apart from visiting Mary's family donkey's years ago, we really didn't know Norfolk.

The advert read "The Holt, Elmham Mill", "A little piece of Heaven in the Norfolk Countryside". Like most adverts it sounded really suitable for our needs. We booked late September for two weeks with a slight concern that the end of September, early October, the east coast could be getting chilly.

We took the M25, for once with no dreadful hold-ups, to Brentwood, Essex for an overnight stay with Keith, our youngest son, and his family before heading the next day to North Elmham. Travelling in beautiful weather with fantastic countryside that had a slight tint of autumn, we found a lovely roadside restaurant for lunch near Brandon before journeying on to Swaffham.

After lunch we found ourselves in the country roads with all their twists and turns. We discovered the road to the dwelling, but managed to pass its entrance twice; missing its all important name. The gates were closed but on pressing the bell our host, Mrs Dee Baker, activated them and we drove across the bridge over the River Wensum onto the island, frightening an Egret and some rabbits as we did so. After a short journey

through woods, orchard and lawns we arrived at the place that would be our home for two weeks.



Dee took us up by lift to our apartment named "The Holt". It was more than we expected, three rooms all beautifully furnished and all had this wonderful view along the River Wensum.

The next day, after a very peaceful sleep, we opening the bedroom curtains to a beautiful day and there below us was the gently flowing river. With the crystal clear water flowing under the Mill and an overflow stream snaking off to our right and just below our bedroom window was 3-4 moorhens, a couple of coots and one small diving duck. Under our bathroom window was a double bird feed with most of the tit family, together with chaffinches, goldfinches and robins. The following day there was a Kingfisher perched on top of the feeder, a mere 3½ feet away from the window, he dived off the feeder into the water for his food. This sort of happening was every day, eventually we saw two Kingfishers.



We went into the local town Dereham, once a market town, where we got food supplies for our needs, looked at local shops and found a Methodist Church for the next day. We then found a nice pub with lovely garden were we once again sat outside for lunch. As we drove back the three miles to the Mill we pulled off the road to view a massive pig farm with hundreds of pigs going about their business. All were spotlessly clean and no nasty smells. Back at the Mill we were able to sit in the garden in the late afternoon sunshine.

Sunday, after standing at the kitchen window eating our breakfast whilst watching the feeding birds, we left for church. It was their Harvest Service and we were made very welcome and invited to their Harvest Shared Lunch, a lovely group of 40 top 50 folk, mainly all Senior Citizens. What came across was that not many of them were local born. They were from South Wales, the Midlands and London, all now retired to this area, it was great sharing time with them.

Do you remember maybe 40 years ago the Reverent Hedley Lyddon and his wife Rosemary, well after they left Martin Way they went to Hayes, then on to full retirement in Shrewsbury, where years later Hedley passed away. To be near their daughter Rosemary moved to a Christian run home just outside Dereham . Starting off in a bungalow and now because of age and lack of movement is now in a lovely room overlooking the garden. So after church we visited her for a couple of hours, we chatted through all the memories of yesteryear and had a real smashing time. It was pleasing to see her looking so well, I think now in her 92nd year.

Rosemary sends her love and best wishes to all who remember her.

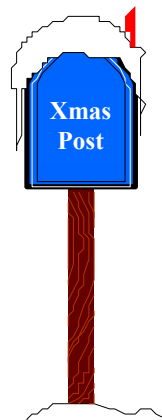

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CAROL SINGING

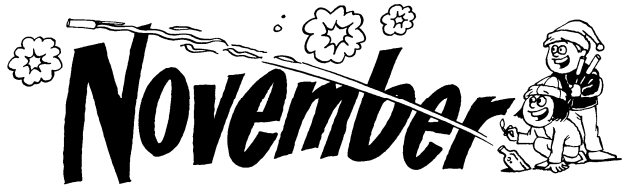
I know it is only November, but this is just a quick advanced notice. We are planning some carol singing at Morden Underground Station in December as we do every year.
