MINISTER'S LETTER

Against a backdrop of challenge and change for the Methodist Church, as declining membership figures and reduced numbers of ordained ministers in active service etc., continue to highlight, this year's Conference took the decision to reaffirm Our Calling, a statement adopted by the Conference in 2000. To refresh memories, this read:



The calling of the Methodist Church is to respond to the gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out its discipleship in worship and mission

The Church exists to:

- Increase the awareness of God's presence and celebrate God's love (Worship)
- Help people to grow and learn as Christians, through mutual support and care (Learning and Caring)
- Be a good neighbour to people in need and to challenge injustice (Service)
- Make more followers of Jesus Christ (Evangelism)
 (Our Calling Conference Report 2000)

In reaffirming this understanding of our calling as a church, certain priorities have been identified, including:

- To make more followers of Jesus Christ through mission and evangelism
- To help members deepen their faith and to put their faith into action (discipleship)
- To find ways to support improvement in the quality of worship offered to God
- To grow the number, variety and breadth of vocations
- To develop the property of the Church to support mission and evangelism
- To be a more inclusive and welcoming Church

- To evaluate and revise decision making processes of the Church so that they are effective and efficient enabling the Church to pursue its commitment to mission
- To enable the Church to be a good neighbour, especially to people in need, to be prophetic and to challenge injustice

In developing these priority areas, certain guiding principles and values core to the Methodist Church have been identified. These include:

- Connexional Church: The sense of being connected to a wider community throughout (at local church, circuit and district level) provides a sense of belonging and common purpose. This enables mutual support and the sharing of resources. In the sharing of resources and of experiences it is important that local churches and circuits have sufficient flexibility to make decisions in order to be responsive to the needs of the local communities.
- Working in Partnership: Wherever possible the Methodist Church will work in partnership with others at all levels and in many areas.
- Inclusive Church: The Methodist Church must be an inclusive and diverse community where all are welcome and the needs of the weak and vulnerable are recognised. Leadership throughout the church should reflect this and be inclusive.
- Teamwork and cooperation between the lay and ordained members: The complementary roles of lay and ordained are essential to the decision making process and the oversight of the Methodist Church.
- Recognising and accepting that the Methodist Church is smaller today and that it must therefore behave like one that has c. 180,000 members. This means that structures, decisionmaking processes and ways of working need to be adapted and choices made about which work we need to lay down for a time
- Being prepared to set priorities: The Methodist Church must agree some focussed priorities under the Our Calling agenda.

 Sticking with a consistent message and plan for the next few years, resisting the desire to move on to the next thing. Educating and empowering all members with a clear vision, direction and plan for the Church so that all could own it and support it.

I appreciate that this "letter" is less personal than usual and that there is a lot of information here, but I wanted you to be aware of the reasoning and thinking that will be underpinning future conversations in our Leadership Team and Church Council meetings. Beyond that, I offer this to you in the hope that it will help you to reflect upon your own life of discipleship as you seek to respond to the gospel of God's love in Christ.

September Press Releases from CSW

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. 2 Corinthians 1:3-4

This verse powerfully reminds us that when we ask God to comfort others, we do so in the knowledge of times when God has extended that same mercy and comfort to us. This allows us to pray in faith and confidence, knowing that God will answer our prayers for others: even when we pray for people who are as far away as Nigeria or China.

Urgent Prayer for Leah Sharibu

Last month, a humanitarian worker, one of three abducted by the al Barnawi faction of Boko Haram in May, was executed. Saifura Husseini Ahmed, a Muslim, was a 25-year-old mother of two. She had dedicated her life to helping others, working as a midwife in a camp for those who have had to flee their homes because of terrorist violence.

Worse still, the group has threatened to kill the remaining hostages, including Leah Sharibu, in one month unless the Nigerian government responds to its demands. We're asking CSW supporters to pray every day at 5.30 pm: please join us for this time of focused, intense prayer.

Pray for Zion Church

We received the news that Zion Church, one of Beijing's largest unregistered Protestant 'house' churches, was shut down on 9th September by the authorities.

This comes after a period of harassment of the 1,500 member strong church following the passage of the Regulations on Religious Affairs (RRA) on 1st February 2018. Many of Zion's satellite meeting places have been forcibly shut down, and church members have been harassed at their homes and workplaces.

Please pray:

- For Leah Sharibu's immediate release
- Asking God to protect her and her family

- That God would protect the members of Zion Church from further harassment
- That they would find somewhere safe to worship
- That the restrictions on freedom of religion that began this crackdown would be relaxed or lifted.

Pray for Iran:

We're continuing to pray for all the Iranian Christians who are either facing or serving harsh prison sentences, or who are seeking refuge elsewhere. Many have appealed their sentences. However, we recently learned that the unjust sentences given to four of them were upheld.

Lord, you are indeed the God who sets prisoners free and upholds the cause of the oppressed. We continue to lift to you those in Iran who received long prison sentences for taking part in normal church activities. Grant them protection, provision and, ultimately, freedom. Amen.

For Nigeria:

'We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair, persecuted but not abandoned, struck down but not destroyed.'

2 Corinthians 4:6-9

Reverend Yunusa Nmadu, CEO of CSW – Nigeria, used the Apostle Paul's words to describe the plight of Christians in northern Nigeria, at our Pursue Justice Live event this year.

Heavenly Father, we lift the nation of Nigeria to you, and especially Christians in the north and Middle Belt. We know that although they are persecuted, you, Lord, have not abandoned them. Grant them heavenly protection and supernatural endurance, and move powerfully on the hearts of those in government, convicting them to ensure justice and protection. Amen.

It's no understatement to say that North Korea is one of the most oppressive regimes in the world, imprisoning thousands of its citizens in labour camps and controlling the everyday life of its people in ways that are barely imaginable. Though we've been seeing some steps towards dialogue between North Korea, South Korea and the United States, there's still a long way to go before the peninsula is truly on the path to freedom.

Heavenly Father who is above all rulers and governments, we bring the nation of North Korea to you today. Please watch over its people as they hunger for a world very different from to their own, and guide the hearts of its rulers towards genuine peace and freedom. Amen

There will be a donation plate in which to put your donation after the morning service on 18th November.

Gift Suggestions

Please fill your box with a selection from the following or similar items. All gifts should be new.

TOYS

Include items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls or stuffed toys (with CE label), toy trucks, harmonica, yo-yo, skipping rope, ball, small puzzles etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS

Toothbrush and toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Please note: 2018 will be the last year that toothpaste can be included, due to increasing customs regulations.

OTHER ITEMS

Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set, wind up torch, wrapped sweets (best-before-date must be at least March of the following year).

Please note: 2018 will be the last year that sweets can be included, due to increasing customs regulations.

DO NOT INCLUDE

Used or damaged items, war related items such as toy guns, play soldiers or knives; chocolate or other food items; liquids or lotions of any type including bubbles; medicines; hand-made or knitted stuffed toys; anything of a political, racial or religious nature; sharp objects; glass containers, mirrors or fragile items; playing cards of the 4-suit variety; clothing other than as listed above.

If you feel you can help, see the knitted and crotchet pattern below and there will be colouring poppies left at Martin Way for people to take away and join in if they want. We also have lots of black buttons to put in the middle of your poppies – if you would like any of these, please ask me. You are also welcome to be creative and make poppies out of felt or tissue paper – this is up to you.

I will leave a box to collect any poppies made in the vestry and please leave your donations there by **Sunday 4th November**

Knitted Poppies

For the best finish, knit with a Double Knit (DK yarn). The size of needle you choose will determine how big the poppy will be, but we recommend 3.5mm or 3.75mm (UK9). If you have different yarn left in your stash, just use that and the appropriate needle size. If you have any problems with any of the techniques in the poppy patterns - and you have access to the internet - you will find lots of tutorial videos on youtube.

Easy garter/knit stitch pattern for beginners

Colour A Bright Red (one ball will make a lot of poppies!) Colour B Scrap of Black or a black button Body of Poppy Using Col A cast on 120 stitches.

Rows 1-4 Knit Row 5 Knit 3 stiches together across the row(40 stiches) Rows 6-9Knit Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(20 stitches) Rows 11-14 Knit

Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(10 stitches)

Cut yarn leaving a tail of about 20cm Thread tail through a yarn needle and slip all the remaining live stitches onto the yarn tail and pull tight. Pull around into a circle and then mattress stitch (or use whatever stitching you normally use) to seam for an invisible seam. Sew in ends.

Centre of Poppy

Using B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre. Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy.

2. Easy ribbed poppy pattern

Colour A 1 ball red yarn (this will make a lot of poppies)

Colour B Scrap of black yarn or black button

Body of Poppy

Using Col A Cast on 60 stitches

Row s1 -10: K2, P2 across whole row (for a slightly smaller poppy do 8 rows of rib).

Row 11: Knit 2 stitches together across the row (30 stitches).

Row 12 : Slip 1 stitch, Knit 2 stitches together then pass the slip stitch over... repeat across the whole row (10 stitches).

Break off yarn with long tail and thread back through remaining stitches using yarn needle and pull tight. Join edges with mattress stitch

Centre of Poppy

Using B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre. Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy.

Crocheted Poppies

You will need some red wool and a black button.

Patterns

1. Three petal crochet poppy with 4.5mm hook Ch 3, join with slst to form circle. Ch 3, work 9 dc into the centre of the circle and join with slst. Work the three petals separately. Petal 1. Ch 3, work 1st dc into same st, work 2 dc into each of the next 3 sts. ch 1 work 2 sc into each st, tie off. Petal 2. work 2 dc into last dc of previous petal, work 2 dc into each of the next 3 sts. ch 1 work 2 sc into each st, tie off. Work petal 3 as 2. Sew all ends in and attach button in the centre.

2.Two petal crochet poppy

Rnd 1: With 3mm hook and wool, ch2. Make 10dc in 2nd ch from hook. Join with a slst in 1st dc. (10sts) Rnd 2: *ch1 dc ch1 2tr in next st, 3tr in next st, 2tr ch1 dc in next st, slst in next 2sts. rep from * once again. Rnd 3: *ch1 3dc in next 2 sts, 2dc in next 5sts, 3dc in next 2 sts, slst in next 2sts. rep from * once again. Fasten off. Attach button in the centre.

Stitch explanation st(s) = stitch (es)

ch = chain rep=repeat dc = double crochet rnd=round htr = half treble crochet slst = slip stitch r = row tr = treble crochet




