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MINISTER'S LETTER

In a recent newsletter article, I suggested that we should talk about ageing more. This month I'm going to go a step further and say that we should also talk about death. I mention this because November begins with All Saints Day. This special day in the church year is an invitation to confront the reality of



death that, accepting its reality, we might more fully appreciate not only life itself but also our place in the life of the world. It does this by encouraging us to remember and give thanks for those saints who've gone before us, those women and men in whom God has been revealed to us but who now are dead.

We are, in fact, entering a season of remembering in which the ancient feasts of All Saints and All Souls are placed alongside the more recent addition of Remembrance Sunday. Death is central to our understanding of all of these.

As a general rule and certainly in our own culture, we don't like to think about death too much. We don't like to contemplate our own mortality. More often than not we seek to distract ourselves from thinking about such matters and/or we seek to protect ourselves from death. We might buy and surround ourselves with more and more things in the vain hope that this will somehow shield us from death. We might worry endlessly about our bodies, taking all sorts of measures to hold back the inevitability of growing old and dying. We might do our utmost not to talk about death in real terms - not mentioning that someone has died and is dead but rather speaking of someone passing away or of loved ones who've lost someone.

And perhaps, when someone whom we love dies, we might comfort ourselves by pretending that this isn't really death. Here Henry Scott Holland's 'Death is nothing at all: I have only slipped away into the next room' springs to mind for this and other poems like it are frequently requested at funerals. But, as Dave Tomlinson points out in his reflection on the communion of saints*, '...that's not really true is it? Death is something; it's something devastating. And our loved ones aren't really in the next room. In the end we have got to get beyond the sentiment and face the fact that a hole now exists in our life.'

Dave goes on to quote Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the Christian theologian executed by the Nazis, who had plenty of time to contemplate death in his prison cell and who in one of his famous letters from prison wrote:

'Nothing can make up for the absence of someone we love...it is a nonsense to say that God fills the gap; God doesn't fill it, but on the contrary, God keeps it empty and so helps us keep alive our former communion with each other, even at the cost of pain...the dearer and richer the memories, the more difficult the separation. But gratitude changes the pangs of memory into tranquil joy. The beauties of the past are borne, not as a thorn in the flesh, but as a precious gift in themselves.'

Dave reflects, 'We don't have to recover from the death of a loved one. There is a gap in our lives that may never be filled. The Christian hope is not asking us to pretend that death hasn't happened - it is reminding us that the pain we carry will some day turn into gratitude, joy and wonder.'

All Saints Day is an invitation to face head-on the reality of death. It's also an opportunity to celebrate the lives of people now dead - but who served God faithfully in life - with a deep sense of gratitude, joy and wonder that we might draw strength and inspiration from them. In doing this, we might then - in life and death - be a source of strength and inspiration for others.

A Tribute to Gill Davies

I have known Gill for many years whenever she came to MWMC on regular visits from Birmingham. It was only in latter years when she moved down south that I got to know this fresh-faced lass with a brummie accent proper. She had a freshness and openness about her, was caring, considerate and witty and we quickly became friends. There was always a welcome at Gwen and Gill's home, whether by appointment or just in passing with Gwen saying 'find yourself a seat' and Gill's offering her own seat! Whenever I visited it was an open house, both would give of their time and hospitality and I came away receiving more than I had given.

There were good times with Gill and I enjoying nature walks in Cannon hill common, trips to garden centres and coffee shops - black coffee and creamed scone usually and, depending on the mood, some great chats. She loved nature and the freedom of being outdoors and spent many hours pottering in her garden. During our walks in the park I think she knew every dog we met and delighted in making a fuss of them. Likewise, she loved watching the geese and ducks and listen to the birdsong.

Having lots in common, there would invariably be discussions about our nursing days, how the nursing care was so much better in our day before the age of technology. How, i.e. patients would open up during a bed bath and one could find out more about their background than they would ever disclose in a consulting room interview. I can envision her as the matron who wanted only the best for her patients and expected the highest standards of care from her staff. Indeed she more recently demonstrated her skills in the Care home when one of the residents collapsed and Gill remained with that person until help arrived. She was a nurse to the end.

As Gill's cruel illness took hold and she got progressively worse with vision impairment and hearing loss, there was less conversation on the walks but she could still pat the dogs. Instead of conversing we would often sing especially hymns to the Creator of the Universe. I got to know and share Gill's favourite hymns - 'Great is thy faithfulness' and 'How great thou Art'. It seemed rightly appropriate, in this setting, to sing and 'join with all nature in manifold witness, to thy great faithfulness, mercy and love' with Gill knowing all the words. These walks became times of

praise and worship as we prayed the hymns and, music, especially, was the therapy that Gill benefitted from.

Music played a large part in Gill's life as did her faith. Being a staunch Methodist, she worshipped for many years at Wesley's Chapel. I gather also that she was 'born in song' as her grandfather was the choir master and organist of the church where she grew up. No wonder she was familiar with the hymns particularly those of Charles Wesley's. It was through Gill that a group of us started singing sessions at the Care home, as a way to communicate with her and it was such a joy to see her responding positively. Gill was one of the first to echo a resounding 'Amen' to the prayers that were said and to order a 'shush' if we became too noisy.

An abiding memory is that at least on two occasions when I took Gill to our evening communion services here. She was often agitated and confused when I went to pick her up but with gentle persuasion she would eventually get in the car. It seemed that as soon as she entered the church building it has a calming effect on her, it was familiar territory and she was at peace. Likewise when we attended coffee & chat, though it took a little time to realise where she was, owing to her poor sight and hearing, she soon sensed a friendly atmosphere, became relaxed and would often join in the conversations.

Another memory, just a year ago on her birthday stays in my mind. Sue and I were visiting Gill and Gwen and joined them for cake and a glass of bubbly., (as you do). Gill was having a conversation with Annette and Gwen remarked that she sounded like the old Gill, giggling and joking. When Gwen started to tease her (probably a brummie joke that was lost on me)! she promptly turned her back on us and continued the conversation. (this I have it on video). Hard to believe this was only a year ago and since then her health had deteriorated rapidly with many hospital admission before going into the care home. Despite her failing health, at her last communion service at the Care home, I'm told that she radiated peace and was transformed for that period of time.

It was heartbreaking to see the breakdown of her physical and mental health and the toll this was taking on Gwen. This is an opportunity to thank Moira and Sue for supporting Gwen and Gill throughout this difficult time. They lavished care and attention not only as pastoral visitors but as a labour of love.

Stuart K. Hind who wrote the other of Gill's favourite hymns 'How great thou art' was purported to have said "When we have reached that heavenly home, we will fully understand the greatness of God and will bow in humble adoration, saying to him, O Lord, my God, how great thou art". May we all, like Gill, live in such a way that we will be ready when Jesus Christ appears to receive the saints. Gill was one of those saints who knew where her destiny lay. I've been so privileged to have known her.

"And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off? I tell you, he will see that they get justice, and quickly." Luke 18:6-8

Jesus' words, from the parable of the persistent widow, remind us that God has promised to bring about justice for his people and will not 'keep putting them off'. We have a faithful God who answers prayers: though it sometimes feels as if the answers are slow in coming, Jesus reminds us he's the opposite of the unjust judge in the story. All we need to do is 'keep praying and not give up'.

With that in mind, please keep praying fervently for Leah Sharibu.

We received reports that the al Barnawi faction of Boko Haram had executed the second of three female aid workers it captured in March. 25-year-old Hauwa Liman was working as a midwife for the International Red Cross when she was taken by the group in March this year. She was also studying Health Education at Maiduguri University in Borno State. Boko Haram stated that the remaining healthcare worker and mother of two, Alice Ngaddah, and 15-year-old Leah will be their slaves for the rest of their lives.

Words cannot express the pain Hauwa's family and friends must be feeling, and we stand with them at this time. We're redoubling our efforts to urge the Nigerian government to negotiate the release of Leah and Alice, in confidence that God is a god of justice, even when it seems a breakthrough is slow in coming.

In summary, please pray:

- For the immediate release of Leah and Alice
- That the international community quickly take action on their behalf
- For God to comfort Hauwa's family in their grief
- That the government of Nigeria would do everything in its power to secure the release of Leah, Alice and other remaining hostages.

Attacks on farming communities in central Nigeria continue as Fulani militia act with impunity, Kidnappers have made the Abuja to Kaduna road unsafe for travellers; armed gangs have wreaked havoc on Hausa communities in northern Kaduna and Zamfara states; and Boko Haram appears resurgent. Please pray for Nigeria's deliverance from every source of violence.

Leah Sharibu was the only Christian among 110 girls abducted from their school in Dapchi, Yobe State by Boko Haram in February. At the time of writing she is the only one still in captivity, and is facing a direct threat to her life. Please join us in fervent prayer for her.

A resurgent Boko Haram is inflicting casualties on the military. In July the army lost many soldiers in attacks in Jilli in Yobe State, and Bama in Borno State. In August 17 soldiers were killed in an attack on a military base in Borno. Pray for comfort and provision for bereaved families; for an effective well-resourced counter-insurgency strategy, and for an end to all sources of terrorism, including Boko Haram. In July armed kidnappers killed several travellers on the Abuja to Kaduna highway, and abducted scores more for ransom. Meanwhile the army is beginning to make headway against armed bandits in Zamfara who have killed or kidnapped thousands of Hausa farmers, in violence that has been ongoing since 2012. Pray that efforts to secure both areas are successful.

Fulani herder militia continue to attack villages in central states, and are occupying some of them. In Plateau State, where 238 people were killed over a two-day period, 54 communities have been occupied and renamed and 11,833 people are living in 17 camps – most of them women, children and the elderly. Pray urgently for an end to this appalling violence and for the government to act decisively to punish the perpetrators and return seized land.

Central Nigeria is the nation's bread basket. Many farmers can no longer return to their fields, either because they have been occupied or out of fear of attacks from Fulani militia, leading to risk of food shortages or famine. They desperately need the protection of their government. Please pray that it would be extended to them soon.

Give thanks for the return of 16-year-old Zainab Boulus Bawa from Kaduna State, who regained her freedom four months after being abducted, forcibly converted and forced to marry her abductor. Keep praying for the release of Habiba Isiyaku, still held captive at time of writing; and for other Christian girls still in the hands of their abductors; and for this practice to cease.

Father God, we lift Nigeria to you. We ask you to bind the nation's wounds and bring restoration; to heal those whose hearts are broken by the loss of loved ones; to protect and deliver endangered communities; and to set every captive free. Amen.


